

SOS MEDITERRANEE is a European civil-society organisation for search and rescue at sea, founded in 2015 by citizens determined to act in the face of the tragedy of shipwrecks in the Mediterranean. With our rescue ships – first the *Aquarius*, then the *Ocean Viking* – we rescued 42,741 people in distress between February 2016 and December 2025, in international waters of the central Mediterranean.

Foreword

2025

marked ten years of SOS MEDITERRANEE: ten years of citizen engagement to save lives at sea, ten years of solidarity in the Mediterranean, where European states continue to shirk their responsibilities.

We were glad to celebrate this anniversary with our teams and volunteers, while restating an obvious point: Our organisation was never meant to become a long-term substitute for state institutions. But ten years after our creation, the continued absence of a systemic, state-led search and rescue mechanism remains deeply concerning.

The year began on a painful note, with the death of Rahaf, a young Syrian girl our teams were unable to save. Like all victims of these crossings, she reminds us that behind the numbers are faces, families, and destinies. In 2025, at least 1,876 people lost their lives in the Mediterranean.

In a global context marked by humanitarian crises, attacks on humanitarian actors, and the erosion of international law, the central Mediterranean was not spared. Administrative obstacles, vessel detentions, and the consistent assignment of distant disembarkation ports continued to reduce humanitarian rescue capacity at sea. Despite these obstacles, the *Ocean Viking's* crew assisted 1,358 people.

The 24th of August 2025 also stands out as a turning point for SOS MEDITERRANEE. Our medical rescue ship came under live fire from a Libyan coastguard patrol boat while sailing in international waters. This unprecedented attack on our crew – sailors and humanitarian workers – sparked a wave of support that helps us hold on to hope in humanity.

As I prepare to pass the helm of my presidency, what stays with me most is the remarkable commitment of our volunteers, paid staff, and all our supporters. Despite the obstacles, we will continue to defend the right to life, fraternity, and solidarity. More than ever, our three missions – rescue, protect, and bear witness – remain fundamental, to fight indifference and reweave bonds of solidarity. ●

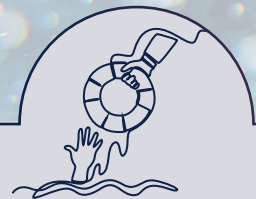

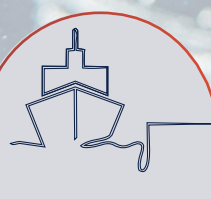

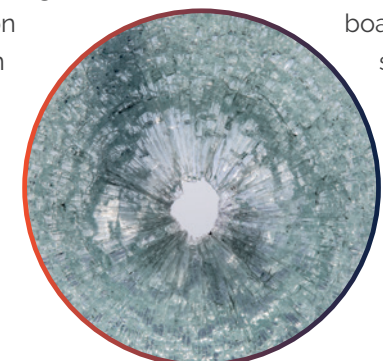

The armed attack against the *Ocean Viking*

On 24 August, the *Ocean Viking* was targeted and fired upon by a Libyan coastguard patrol boat while sailing in international waters with 87 rescued survivors on board.

The attack caused significant damage to the ship, including the bridge, communication and navigation systems, and the lifeboats. More than 100 rounds struck the ship, some penetrating

the bridge at head level. Given the severity of the situation, the maximum-security alert level was triggered for the first time in SOS MEDITERRANEE's operational history. This attack targeted not only the survivors and humanitarian crew on board, but also the ship's rescue capability. It illustrates the escalating violence at sea by the Libyan coastguard.



Together **for rescue**

In the skies The Albatross Uno

Through a partnership with the *Humanitarian Pilots Initiative*, a Swiss NGO, a plane was chartered and began flying over the central Mediterranean in November. From the air, the crew complements the *Ocean Viking's* work by monitoring the sea and relaying alerts, enabling more precise detection of human rights violations and earlier detection of emergencies

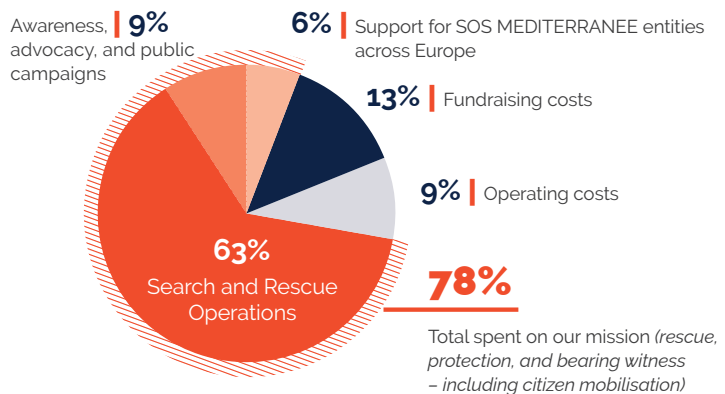


Expenditure
