The Problem

Overnight schools closed in Ghana during the coronavirus pandemic with little other support offered. Rural African children rely on school for access to basic needs such as water, sanitation and sometimes food. The schools closures also put children at increased risk of exploitation, child labor, or early marriage. Without the protective environment of school, children were more vulnerable to abuse or exploitation.

When the schools reopened in January 2021 many children had fallen far behind in terms of literacy and numeracy. Many experience learning loss, which means that they may have forgotten much of what they have learned in school before the pandemic. This put them at a huge disadvantage when they eventually return to school. Children in rural areas had limited or no access to remote learning options, which further exacerbated learning loss and hindered their educational progress, as they struggled to catch up.

Educating children: increases economic growth, promotes gender equality, improves health, enhances social development. Leading to better employment prospects and increased income. Educated individuals are far more likely to make informed decisions for their families.

My Name is Nemo, I'm 14 years old



Nemo is cheeky, inquisitive, bright and he loved school, wanted to be a teacher.

He lives in a remote rural village in the Eastern Region of Ghana, called Abenta, about 300 miles north of the equator .

The impact of the coronavirus pandemic meant his village school, like 1,000's others closed and without any support and little family guidance Nemo, at 13/14 became a day labourer for hire.

He went back to school when the schools reopened but he had fallen so far behind in terms of literacy and numeracy and his desire to complete his education had passed.

At best, Nemo will now become a subsistence farmer working long, hard days in the hot sun, by the time he is in his mid 30's his body will be broken and his back tired, fighting to put food on the table for his growing family, and the cycle starts again.

We in the wealthier north, can break this cycle of poverty with a well timed, cost effective intervention

Improve the life chances of some of the most vulnerable

There are many children like Nemo, just coping, but still in school struggling in education, the pandemic closed schools and disrupted education for many rural African children, but it cannot extinguish their potential. These children are fighters, resilient and determined to learn, thrive and build a brighter future for themselves and their communities.

We know children the world over are hungry for techie gadgets and love playing games on digital devices. African school children are no different but never get the opportunity. We want to use free literacy and numeracy educational games on low cost Amazon computer tablets to unleash their true potential and overcome the challenges of all the schooling they missed.

We want to purchase 160 x Amazon Fire HD 8 tablets with child proof industrial cases and hold twice weekly after school lessons for children in remote rural villages.

We want to allow a child's love of techie gadgets and the educational game's teaching abilities to improve a child's learning experience.

Moving to digital tablets will not only be a huge hook to entice more children to take extra lessons after school but it will also be a more productive and effective way to improve a student's literacy and numeracy.
