LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

2009 has been an incredible year for PEACE. We have a number of new and exciting programs that are truly creating positive change in the communities where we work. We have focused on refining our cornerstone programs by analyzing and implementing evaluation methods to measure their effectiveness. New projects that are developed and carried out have a strong emphasis on financial sustainability and self-empowerment.

Although reaching financial sustainability takes time and persistence, some of our pilot projects, such as Community Pride's "Grow and Earn", are on their way. In addition, the after school program received the majority of supplies through generous donations from parents and community members thus reducing program costs and increasing sustainability. Our 2009 entrepreneurial themed summer camp for middle school students was 100% sustainable through our internships initiative.

Although the economic downturn has indeed affected our programs in terms of limiting expansion, we have been blessed to receive a great deal of support from the local community in the form of donated supplies, passionate volunteers and much more. Due to the economic circumstances of the past year, most annual donors reduced their donation by 50%. We used this opportunity to significantly increase our donor base through events, fundraisers and social media outreach. While awareness of PEACE has grown tremendously, the need for continued growth is ever present. As we expand our reach, we become aware of the lives that are just beyond it; for with heightened awareness, comes greater responsibility.

We have continued collaborating with a variety of community organizations and governmental agencies throughout México as a means of increasing program efficiency while strengthening community cohesion.

We are starting 2010 with an incredible team of talented individuals whose passion and dedication to community activism is transforming many aspects of life in the villages where we work. Thank you to all PEACE supporters, volunteers and community members for making the amazing work we do possible. We look forward to seeing you in 2010! Read on to learn more about PEACE.

ONE LIFE AT A TIME

In 2009, 35 passionate employees operated on \$388,000 (USD) via grants, fundraisers, donations and sales. PEACE served more than 7000 people and 3500 animals in over 35 communities across 3 states. More than 234,500,000 unwanted animal births were prevented. Over 1000 students participated in education programs. 250 students increased their education time by 35% for less than \$1 (USD) a day and 150 children received free dental care from licensed dentists. Volunteers clocked more than 10,000 hours and more than 150 recycled product designs were sold in both Mexico and the United States. Over 40 women increased their household income thereby improving the lives of more than 118 children. Over 645 students participated in environmental education and 10 tons of plastic, glass and metal were recycled.

HISTORY

Although officially founded in 2005, one of PEACE's main programs began in 2003 when Ayuda los Animales (Help the Animals) ran its first spay/neuter clinic in the Bahia de Banderas. In 2004, Molly Fisher, a social entrepreneur, conceived the idea of a replicable, non-profit social enterprise working at the grassroots level. Punta de Mita was the starting point for many reasons. The region is small in size and population and was without community assistance programs. Development and tourism created a unique set of circumstances that provided the potential for funding through both donations and sustainable businesses.

In 2005 Casa Comunidad (Community House) was born with the help of a donated space and twenty-three enthusiastic students. Meanwhile the PEACE Boutique (formerly know as Art & Philanthropy) opened their doors in Punta de Mita. Over the next two years, Molly laid the groundwork for her vision of PEACE. A crucial part of this development was establishing positive and effective relationships with the Mexican government, donors, influential community members, dedicated volunteers and other non-profit organizations.

In 2006 the Manos Unidas artesian co-op was created to empower and educate local women while providing financial independence and economic opportunities. Since then, over 40 women in the Bahia de Banderas have benefited from this inspirational and life changing program.

2007 and 2008 were years of programmatic and geographic expansion. Community Pride was implemented and PEACE programs spread to surrounding communities. Following the PEACE dream of creating a model that could be replicated, the PEACE movement stretched across the country to Isla Mujeres where PEACE began consulting with a local group of like-minded individuals who began their own independent branch: *PEACE Isla Mujeres*.

2009 was marked by increased efficiency, quality and effectiveness of our work. While there was a decrease in the number of towns and staff, we saw great improvements in towns where PEACE programs were carried out coupled with an increased desire for PEACE programs in other towns and regions.

At the end of 2009, PEACE had 35 employees working in 6 towns (not including the 30+ towns where the mobile spay and neuter clinic works). The results have been amazing! Read on to learn more about PEACE's incredible programs, initiatives and impact.





COLLABORATION SPOTLIGHT

PEACE + OTHER ORGANIZATIONS = MORE HELP FOR THE COMMUNITY

How? As a permanent fixture in the community, PEACE often acts as the conduit between transformative international organizations and the local population. We provide a landing point for groups that can travel the world making positive change. Here are the highlights from two of the organizations that visited us in 2009.



For the second year in a row, the Academy of LDS Dentists provided over 150 children from Emiliano Zapata, Corral del Risco and Higuera Blanca with free dental care and much needed dental education.

Casa Campesina

(PEACE Headquarters) was transformed into a fully functioning dental clinic for two weeks with lines of children waiting anxiously outside. The majority of these children had never before received dental care. This inspirational group of dentists not only shared their professional expertise, but through their unique and caring approach, helped to ease the fears of these first-time patients.





Over 75 children from the primary school in Emiliano Zapata were able to participate in a jaw-dropping dance and music workshop presented by internationally renowned Celebrate the Beat. Tracy Straus, CTB Director, two dance instructors, award winning musicians and a professional artist spent two weeks teaching choreographed dances using their pioneering method of communicating through movement and music. Students created magnificent painted back-drops which were unveiled in the grand finale.
