– Establishing flexible care models that adapt to displacement, mobility, and evolving risks

– Positioning mobile clinics as first responders in future humanitarian crises



## **🔍 Project Summary**

Years of conflict in Ethiopia have devastated health systems across Oromia, Amhara, Tigray, and Benishangul gumuz leaving women and children in rural and internally displaced communities without access to lifesaving care. This project will deploy mobile health clinics to reach 250,000+ vulnerable individuals, with a focus on maternal, newborn, and child health, as well as psychosocial support, basic treatments, and reproductive services.

Each mobile clinic will be equipped with skilled health professionals, essential medications, and diagnostic tools, and will serve as a bridge between communities and permanent health infrastructure.

## **🗨️ Pressing Issue and the Problem**

Across northern and central Ethiopia, conflict and displacement have destroyed over 3,000 health facilities, leaving an estimated 10+ million people without access to basic health services. Pregnant women and newborns are dying from preventable causes. Children go untreated for diarrhea, pneumonia, and malnutrition. In many rural or IDP camps, no clinics or ambulances exist at all.

Women and girls also face increased risk of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), with few services available for post-trauma care. Without mobile outreach, these communities remain invisible and underserved.

- ✓ 🚗 70%+ of facilities in conflict zones are non-functional (UN OCHA, 2024)
- ✓ 👤 1 in 27 mothers dies from childbirth complications in rural Ethiopia
- ✓ 🍼 Over 35% of under-5 children in target regions are malnourished
- ✓ ● Most IDP sites lack skilled birth attendants or trauma support

## 💡 How the Project Will Solve the Problem

*Over 4 years, NODRO will:*

- ✓ Deploy 7 mobile health clinics across Oromia, Amhara, Tigray, and Benishangul gumuz
- ✓ Reach 250,000+ patients, prioritizing mothers, newborns, and children
- ✓ Provide prenatal, postnatal, and child care, immunizations, nutrition support, and SGBV response
- ✓ Train 150+ local health workers to continue care in remote areas
- ✓ Offer referrals to hospitals for critical cases through coordination with regional health bureaus
- ✓ Integrate mental health support and community health education

## ✿ Sustainability Plan

### *After the project ends:*

- ✓ Train local staff for handover of services
- ✓ Equip health bureaus and CSOs to run mobile units
- ✓ Establish community health volunteers and peer education
- ✓ Link with Ethiopia's Health Extension Program for ongoing outreach
- ✓ Seek co-funding from local government and donors for expansion

## 🎁 Donation Options

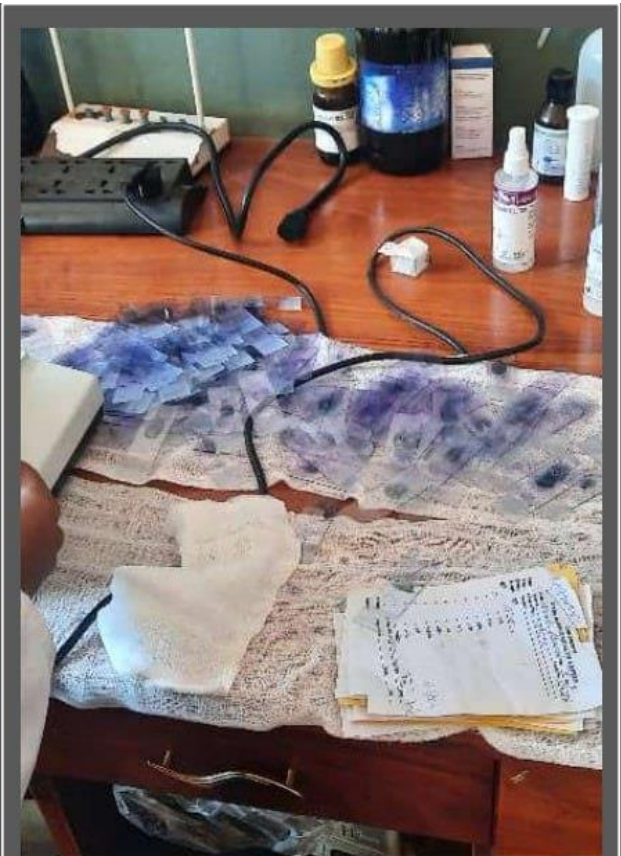
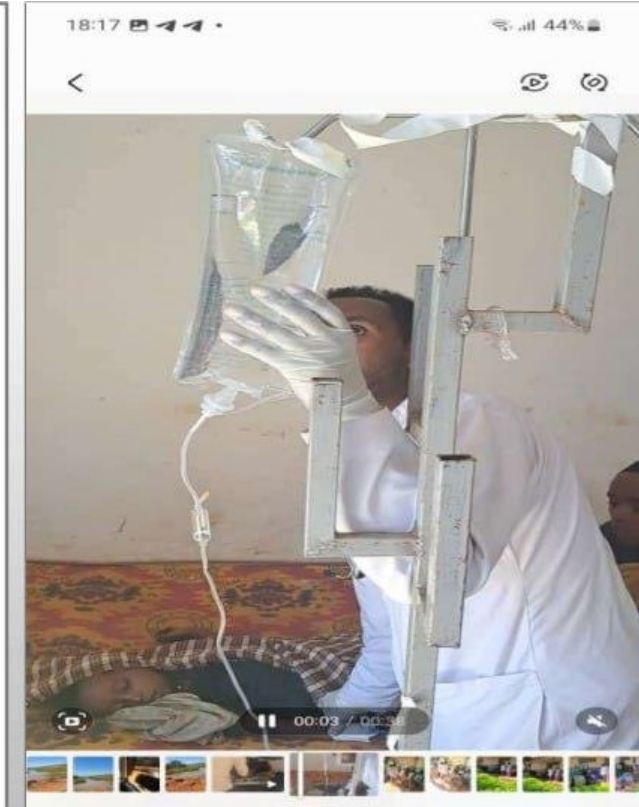

## Monitoring & Reporting Plan

- ✓ Quarterly progress reports detailing patient numbers, services delivered, and outreach locations
- ✓ Digital health records captured using tablets and tools like KoboCollect for real-time data tracking
- ✓ Monthly health worker check-ins to monitor clinic functionality, supply usage, and case trends
- ✓ Patient feedback surveys (verbal or written) to assess satisfaction and identify service gaps
- ✓ SGBV and mental health case documentation handled with confidentiality protocols
- ✓ Annual health impact assessments, including maternal and child health indicators
- ✓ Field visits and spot checks by NODRO program managers and regional health bureau reps
- ✓ End-of-year learning forums with local CSOs, health staff, and community representatives to reflect and adapt
