Donor Briefing | 9-Month - Emergency Field Hospital

The mission of our coalition and dome field hospital in Montego Bay is to *be the heart and hands for those who cannot rebuild alone*. Everyone's needed.



THE CRISIS

Jamaica is resilient — but this disaster struck the poorest and most vulnerable first. When Jamaica faced one of the most devastating natural disasters in its modern history:

- Five western parishes were wiped out, and 124 medical clinics.
- Four major hospital systems lost their roofs entirely.
- Tens of thousands of people were cut off from medical care.
- The hospitality sector — Jamaica's economic engine — is crippled and will take years to rebuild.

HUMAN IMPACT

The people most devastated are those with the least ability to recover. Right now, families are living without electricity or clean water. Hospitals have collapsed past safe operating capacity. We are seeing:

- Children without access to urgent care
- Communities without beds, medication, or safe shelter
- Mothers delivering babies in closets because there is no functioning NICU
- Trauma patients sitting in chairs for a week after operations (as not enough beds.)
- Without immediate intervention, recovery will not be possible for these communities.



WHO WE ARE

In the face of unimaginable loss, something extraordinary happened. Organizations that typically operate independently laid down their logos, egos, and silos — and came together as ONE coalition to help Jamaica rise again. Coalition partners include:

WHAT'S ALREADY SECURED (IN-KIND)

Because of trusted partners, we have already secured critical assets — . Already donated:

- A \$3.5 million, 10,000 sq. ft. field hospital
- Three Connex containers for transport, staging, and storage (Third Wave Volunteers)
- Transportation vehicles (Hyundai of Jamaica)
- Major U.S. hospital systems access to medical equipment and supplies
- 88 pallets of food for patients and water (BBQ RELief)

These gifts position the mission for success — but they do not cover operating costs. To operate this hospital safely and effectively for six-nine months, donor support is critical for the costs that cannot be covered.

HOSPITAL EQUIPMENT NEEDS

Cornwall Regional Medical Center: Priority Equipment to Activate the Field Hospital. Cornwall's Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Curtis Yeates, provided this needs list to fully outfit the 10,000 sq. ft. hospital. Additional items will be added as assessments continue, due to the scale of collapse across Western parishes. Priority needs:

- Defibrillators (2)
- Manual sphygmomanometers (10)
- Vital signs monitors (10)
- ECG machines (4)
- Ultrasound/Echo units (2)
- Infusion pumps (7)
- Mobile X-ray machine (1)
- Ultrasound machine (1)
- Emergency trolleys (6)
- Medication trolleys (6)
- Suction machines (4)
- Patient monitor with ECG (1)
- Medication refrigerators (2)
- Hospital beds (100)
- Bedside tables/lockers (100)
- Over-bed tables (100)

Additional major assets requested: X-ray systems, mobile radiology/diagnostics, MRI capability, ventilators, IV fluids/consumables, sterilization equipment, and surgical support carts.

You may visit Jamaica to tour the field hospital, meet the Minister of Health or hospital leadership, meet U.S. volunteers and Jamaican partners, and to receive documentation for personal or promotional use.
