

Humanitarian Assistance and Guidance




From 2024 and during 2025, support was offered to around 08 inhabitants of Batey Libertad who were arrested in different raids. Fortunately, we were able to help those who were detained return home.

Social assistance was also provided to people of Haitian descent in detention centres, offering them food, water and clothing.

Finally, thanks to a documentation operation in May of 2025, 53 people obtained birth certificates, passports and marriage certificates.

A Stronger Montessori Program

After 2 years of training and preparation, the pre-school teaching team formally began implementing the Montessori methodology in September of 2024. Feeling more capable of the methodology and its objectives, our teachers are helping students develop independence, a sense of order, and concentration.

In 2024-2025 at Batey Libertad we enrolled 38 children in three different classes or groups: beginning to read, reading tutoring, reading and grammar. As you can see from the table, all groups advanced on the scale of the Reading A-Z system, whose lowest value is AA and highest is Z.

In January 2025, class 1A had an enrollment of 14 children, of whom only 4 students could read. Then, in June, 11 children in that class advanced their reading levels significantly.

Literacy Program in Los Mina Sur

For the third consecutive year, 55 enrolled grade 3 students, from the Juan Bautista Zafra school, significantly improved their reading skills in the school year 2024 - 2025. Additionally, the grade 3 teachers of the school were trained in the methodology of the program.

Specifically, in September of 2024 82% of students were in in group 1 (non-readers) and group 2 (syllable reader), in other words, they were reading below the grade 1 level. By June 2025 63% of students improved to reading at a level above grade 2 and 26% read at grade 3 level.

In September 2025, the school district, formed by 58 schools, reported in their official evaluations, that the students who had passed the Yspaniola literacy program showed better results than the average of their peers.

Getting to Know the Dominican Republic Through Public Service

During April and May we welcomed visiting students from Libertas Academy and the Student's Association from Yale University to Batey Libertad, and the College of Education and Human Development of the University of Georgia to Los Mina Sur.

During their stay they were able to spend time with residents of the batey and participated in activities such as: Painting a mural in the learning center, participating in reading hour in our learning center in Batey Libertad, visiting historical sites in Santiago de los Caballeros and Santo Domingo, as well as learning about the challenges faced by people of Haitian descent who live in the batey and in general in the Dominican Republic.

New Projects

Un Batey Más Verde (A Greener Batey)



In the 2024 report we saw how, with the support of Valley Presbyterian Church, we incorporated the component of environmental care and environmental sustainability. To do this, we acquire books and educational materials and develop awareness activities with our students, during reading hour and in the summer camp. We also started exploring how to engage batey neighbors to improve environmental conditions.

At the beginning of 2025, we formally requested the support of the local authorities to carry out cleaning days. At the same time, with the financial support of All People Be Happy, we were able to launch the Greener Batey project, which supports environmental education and the solid waste management system managed by members of the community. Fanm Vayan (Courageous Woman): Women's Empowerment





From September in 2024 to the present day, a group of women from the community began to meet every Saturday to learn how to sew and develop the initial entrepreneurial ideas. Some of them had participated in the workshops to create reusable female towels that had been given months earlier.

This is how Fanm Vayan emerged, "brave woman" in Creole, a group that has 16 women and participated in sewing classes, thanks to private donations raised by Eliza Patterson (2024 PiLA Intern).
