Project Beneficiaries

The project will directly support **3,000 vulnerable children and adolescents** (aged 6 to 18) living in conflict-affected and economically marginalized communities in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

To ensure maximum impact and gender equity, the cohort selection will adhere to the following target distribution:

- **Gender Equality (50% Girls / 50% Boys):** A strict quota of **1,500 girls** and **1,500 boys** will be maintained to address the specific vulnerabilities faced by both genders.
- **Age Disaggregation:**
 - **Children (Ages 6–13): 1,800 participants** focusing primarily on trauma healing, foundational literacy/numeracy, basic health, hygiene, and protection skills.
 - **Adolescents (Ages 14–18): 1,200 participants** focusing on advanced life skills, digital literacy, financial capability, and vocational pathways.
- **Target Vulnerability Sub-groups:**
 - Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) and refugee children fleeing regional violence.
 - Out-of-school children and youth engaged in hazardous child labor (e.g., artisanal mining, informal agriculture).
 - Street children (*shegues*) and youth at high risk of exploitation or recruitment by armed groups.
 - Child-headed households and orphans without stable family support.

2. Indirect Beneficiaries

The positive impact of the life skills program will extend beyond the immediate cohort, positively influencing an estimated **18,000 community members**:

- **Families and Households (Approx. 15,000 individuals):** Parents, guardians, and siblings (calculating an average household size of 5 people per direct beneficiary) will benefit from reduced financial strain, improved household hygiene, better family cohesion, and future income generated by trained adolescents.
- **Local Educators and Community Leaders (Approx. 500 individuals):** Local teachers, religious leaders, and community volunteers who will receive training or work alongside project staff, thereby strengthening local child protection capacities.

- **The Wider Community (Approx. 2,500 individuals):** Neighborhood residents who will benefit from the peace-building, community clean-up, and awareness campaigns organized by the youth, contributing to reduced juvenile delinquency and stronger local security.

Context and Justification of the Project

1. Project Context

The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) continues to face one of the world's most prolonged and complex humanitarian crises. Decades of armed conflict, political instability, and massive internal displacement have severely fractured the country's social and economic infrastructure. Children and youth under the age of 18 make up over 50% of the population, yet they bear the heaviest burden of this instability. In conflict-affected provinces, breakdown of traditional family structures and lack of institutional support leave millions of children highly vulnerable to protection risks, acute poverty, and severe psychological distress.

2. Problem Statement

The targeted population of 3,000 children in the DRC faces a convergence of critical vulnerabilities that severely threaten their development, safety, and future prospects:
