AMDA has been supporting high school students in Tohoku Region of Japan after having experienced a massive destruction from the earthquake and tsunami on March 11th, 2011. International Scholarship Program

AMDA International Scholarship Program has started in March 2011 and so far 298 students from 8 schools have been receiving the scholarship (Please refer to the table 1).

In Japanese fiscal year 2015 (from 1 April 2015 to 31 March 2016), AMDA International Scholarship Program provides 25500 USD to 17 scholarship students in Tohoku Region (please see the table 2). Each student receives 15,000 yen (about 125 USD) per month until she/he graduates their school. Scholarship students aim to be a medical professional in the future.

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(English Translation)

My dream is to become a nurse specializing in palliative care. Respecting time left for each patient, I would like to provide patients psychological support to fully enjoy their lives until the last moment.

I have set this goal because of my mother. She works at a palliative care unit as a nurse. She always listens to elderly patients talking about their good memories for many hours and also spends time in comforting patients who express their fear of death at their bedside.

My mother tells me that she pays special attention to her patients depending on their conditions and chooses suitable care for each patient so that they will have no regrets in their lives.

Having listened to her story, I got to know that the area of nursing varies and each area has different roles. Especially, I became interested in palliative care. Some terminal patients show completely different emotions and facial expressions according to their health condition. I believe how a nurse talks to patients influences their attitudes toward treatment. In the future, as a nurse, I would like to approach patients in a best way depending on their mental and health conditions.
